What is JamPuz?

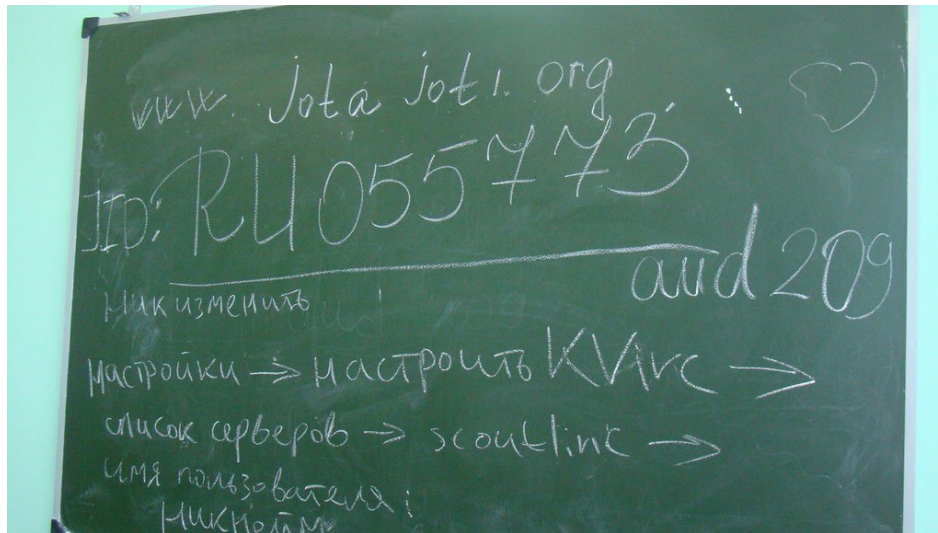
- International game during JOTA-JOTI
- First played in 2010

How works JamPuz?

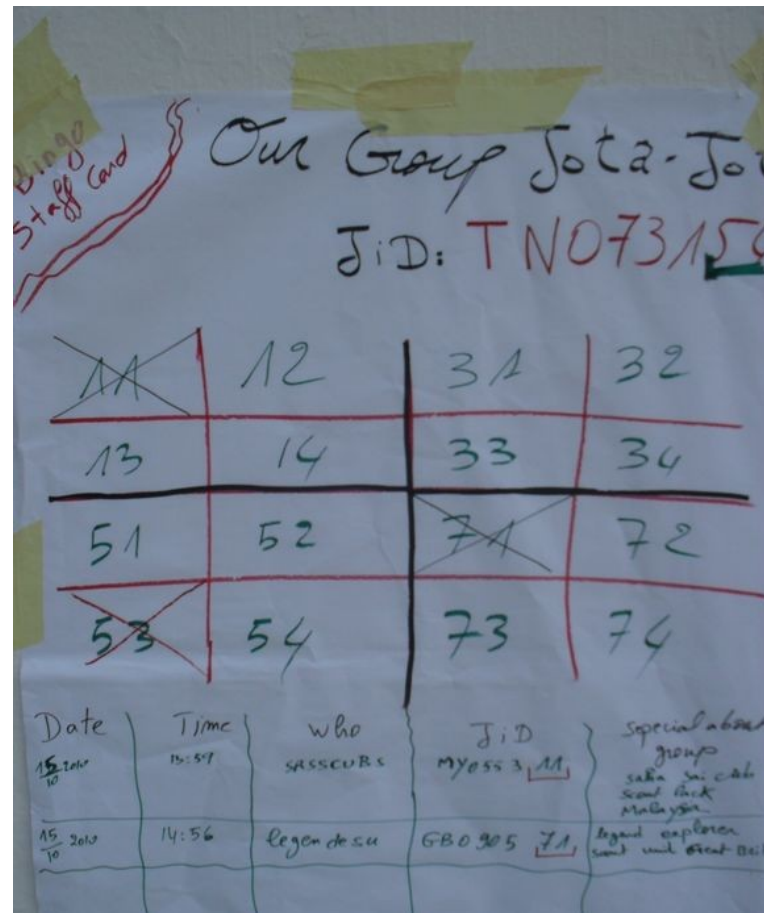
- Each registered group receives a JID-Code
- JID = JOTA-JOTI ID
 - 2 characters ISO country code + 6 digits
 - For example NL0123456, AR098765



Russia

How JamPuz works – part 2

- Groups talk to each other & exchange JID code
- JID codes are registered on website



How JamPuz works – part 3

- JID codes are used in bingo with 7 levels
- You can download a certificate on achieving level 2

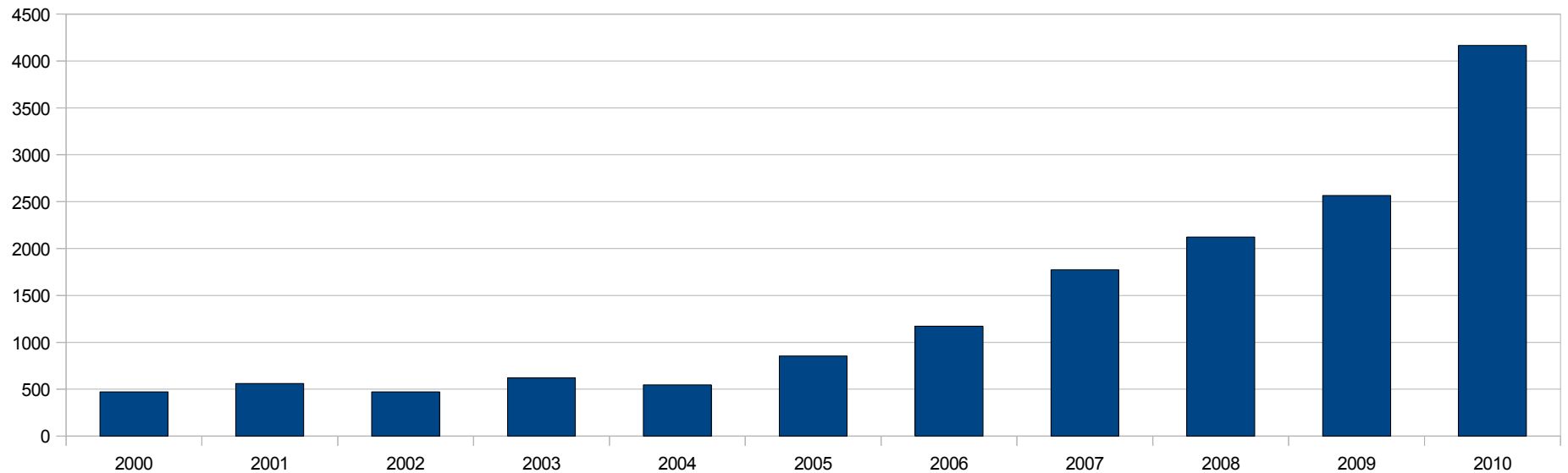

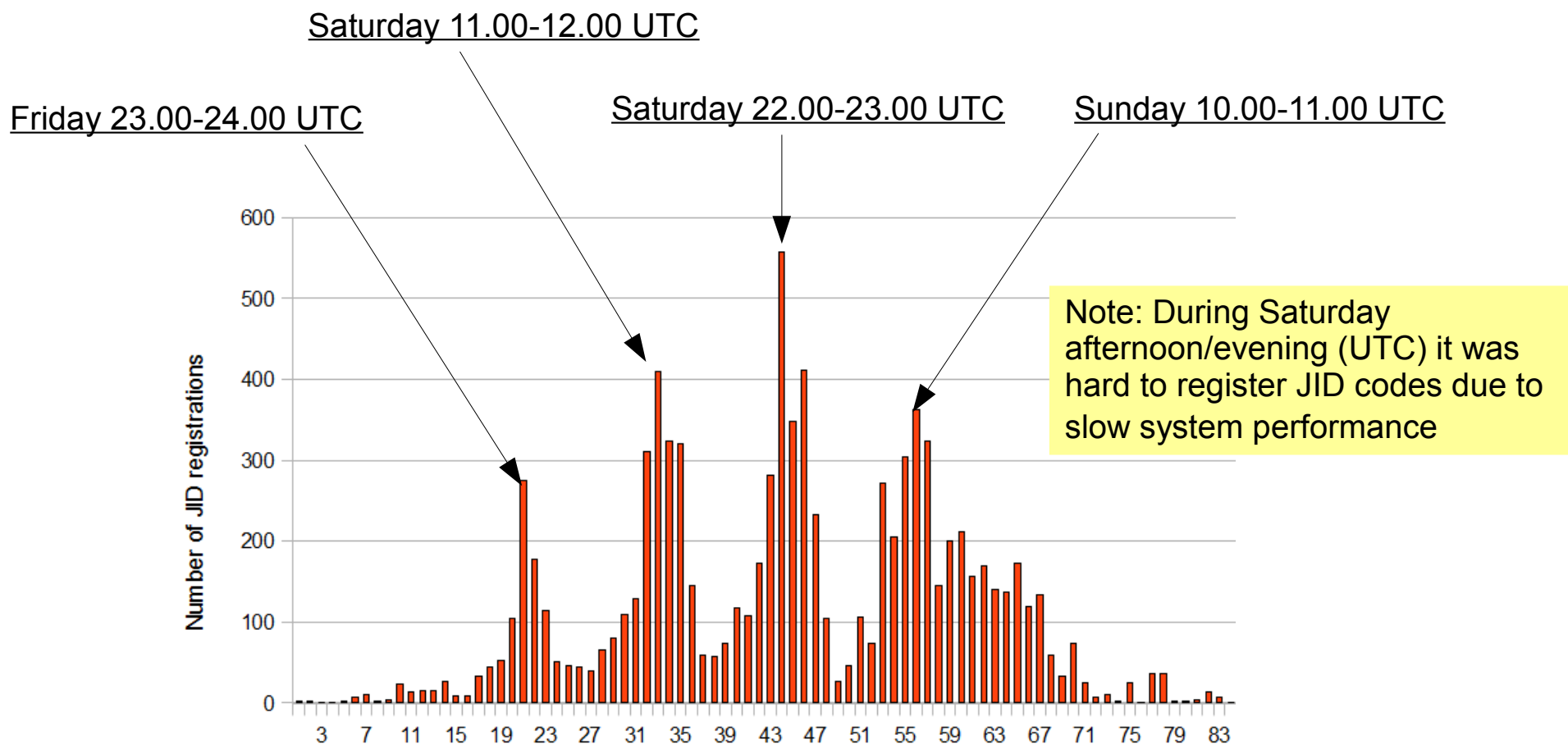


Number of groups in 2010: 4166 on Saturday 23.00 UTC after JOTA-JOTI weekend, final number will be slightly higher

- About 50% of groups that did not play JamPuz in 2010 would (probably) play it in 2011
