### What's New

#### Fifteen climbers reach Baden Powell Peak

After much anticipation, the first batch of climbers made it to the top of the 5,890 meter Baden Powell Peak in Nepal. The first information was received from the base camp on 13<sup>th</sup> September relaying the message that those who made to the top were an Australian, seven Koreans, three Singaporeans, one Nepali, and three from Scouts of China. The climbers reached the top safely.

#### Malaysia gets good attendance for regional ICT workshop

Once again, the Scout Association of Malaysia hosted one of the largest regional events this year – the *APR Workshop on ICT in Scouting*. This is the third of a series of workshops to complete the work of the Scouting Profile Sub-Committee in their three-year term. The workshop was held on 5-9 September at Dynasty Hotel in Kuala Lumpur.

The workshop covered the direct link of ICT in major Scouting operational areas such as management, membership system, training of adults, youth events, youth involvement, branding and communications, and marketing.

Around 40 participants represented 12 countries: Australia, Bangladesh, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Maldives, Malaysia, Philippines, Scouts of China and Thailand. Profile Sub-Committee Chairman Dr Mukhyuddin Bin Sarwani directed the workshop with the support of APR executives.

#### Five Scouts Pre-selected for 2007 APR Outstanding Scout Award

Members of the APR Scouting Profile and Programme Sub-Committees evaluated the qualifications of the candidates for the APR Outstanding Scout Award. Five candidates were chosen for the final selection in Tokyo during the regional conference. They are Law Ka Kit of Hong Kong, Prasanth Nanda Kumar of India, Eunseop Shim of Korea, Ahmed Hassan of Maldives and Bruce Willis Sing of the Philippines. The panelists were Richard Miller (Australia), Prakorb Mukura (Thailand) and Jeffrey Ho (Singapore).

#### Bangladesh Scouts help flood survivors

The recent huge flood in Bangladesh sent Scouts to work on rehabilitation activities. Floodwater gripped over 40 out of 60 districts in the country, forcing people to take shelter in high roads, schools, and embankments. Scouts and Rovers helped them to move to safer places and makeshift shelters. They collected food, candles, and primary goods. With very high diarrhoeal incidence, Scouts helped the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Diseases to build a makeshift hospital with 70 beds. As the demand for

ORS was also high, the Scouts collected and distributed 200,000 packets of ORS and 100,000 tablets for water purifying. Bangladesh Scouts and UNDP signed a Memorandum of Understanding on a US\$44,000 project to produce, pack and distributed ORS packets.

### **King of Sweden visits Malaysia**

His Majesty The King of Sweden, on his way to Tokyo, stopped over in Kuala Lumpur for a World Scout Foundation Fellowship. Malaysia's Crown Prince Raja Nazrin Shah, in his full Scout uniform, received the Swedish King.

As Honorary President of the World Scout Foundation, the King awarded gold pins and certificates to new BP Fellows in Malaysia including APR Scout Committee Chairman Eric Khoo.

### **Singapore holds first large-scale Intergenerational Bonding Event**

About 50 trained "Seniors in Scouting" joined hands with more than 120 Cub Scouts and another 10 "Extension Scouts" (attending special education) in the first-ever large-scale intergenerational bonding event. Organized by the Singapore Scout Association (SSA), the event is funded by the Ministry of Community Development, Youth and Sports (MCYS) under the "Golden Opportunities" project.

SSA is the first Scout association in the Asia-Pacific to offer Scouting opportunities for seniors who are at least 50 years old. This initiative encourages seniors to be active and socially engaged through various opportunities to serve the community in a uniquely Scouting way. It also aims to promote lifelong learning, intergeneration-bonding, healthy lifestyles and volunteerism.

### **Awards Committee releases list of regional awardees for 2007**

The APR Awards Committee, comprised of seasoned regional leaders headed by Kirsty Brown of Australia, released the final list of awardees for 2007 after the Regional Scout Committee endorsed the nominations. The awards have three categories – the APR Award for Distinguished Service (8 awardees), Chairman's Award (12 awardees) and the Certificate of Good Service, which is introduced for the first time with ten awardees.

These awards will be conferred at the forthcoming conference. In observance of the golden anniversary of regional Scouting and that of the centenary of world Scouting, this year's awards take cognition of Scout leaders who have rendered exemplary service to the region and to their NSOs over the past many years.

### **Sri Lanka hosts regional countries for a week of adventure**

The second most premier college of Kandy that fully supports Scouting – Kingswood College – has held the Kingswood Scouts Adventure and Orienteering competition for the past 23 years. For this centenary year, the college decided to invite international participation. Indeed, participants came from India, Pakistan, Maldives and Bangladesh who, along with 500 local participants, took the adventure challenge in the historic city of Kandy. Regional Director Abdullah Rasheed, as a special invitee, presented the trophies to the winning local teams along with Chief Commissioner Mr Chandrasena Batuwangala.

During this time, on 1st October, the Kandy district organized the first Kandy Kuboree in commemoration of the centenary of world Scouting, with the Chief Minister of central province as the guest of honor. Both the Regional Director and Chief Commissioner attended the function with over 1,500 participants.

### **International Centenary COMDECA to use new approach**

Bangladesh Scouts, host of the International Centenary COMDECA on 7-13 December 2007, created a planning team who will introduce new approaches for running a Community Development Camp (COMDECA) of an international scale.

The team will involve the expertise of individuals from the World Scout Bureau and experienced Scout organizations such as Gerakan Pramuka/Indonesia which hosted the first World COMDECA in 1993. Gerakan Pramuka appoints Ms Susi Yulianti and Mr Djatmiko Rasmin to the team.

### **New Zealand appoints new Chief Executive**

Mr Chris Hooper took up his appointment as Chief Executive of Scouting New Zealand on 17<sup>th</sup> September. Chris was based in London for three and a half years as the CEO of Special Olympic Great Britain, part of the international volunteer movement providing year round sports training and competition opportunities for young people and adults with learning disabilities. He was a Cub and Scout with a group in England, and lived in New Zealand between 1993-2003 during which time he led the New Zealand Special Olympics movement.

### **APR Scout Conference Update**

As of 1<sup>st</sup> October, there are 509 total participants based on registration forms and lists provided by NSOs and individuals. Out of this number, 415 are from National Scout Organizations, 7 from World Scout Committee, 18 from Regional Committee/Sub-Committees/Consultants, 30 from World Scout Bureau and other regions, 13 from NSOs of other regions, 8 from potential APR countries, 11 from other organizations and the rest are members of APR Foundation, ATAS and APES.

### **APR Youth Forum Update**

On 12-15 October, close to 130 young people are gathering for the 5<sup>th</sup> APR Youth Forum in Tokyo. All 25 member-countries and associate members of the Asia-Pacific Region will be represented together with two from Afghanistan and two from Saudi Arabia. From the current list, around 60% are male and 40% are female participants.

## **What's Upcoming**

### **World Scientific Congress**

The congress will take place in Geneva on 16-17 November 2007. Before that, a youth event will commence on 13 November also in Geneva.

The World Scientific Congress is a key event of the Centenary of Scouting. It aims to provide WOSM a solid foundation in the domain of education and acts as an instrument for the work of Scouting in the area of non-formal education. At the same time, it provides a comparison with Scouting partners, institutions and the academic community. The congress will reflect on two areas: Social Development and Personal Development. There will be plenary sessions and thematic workshops to explore these areas.

Before this congress, young people aged under 30 are invited to participate in a youth event that will be a forum for exchange and debate. The event could help draw out a community of young researchers and young practitioners in non-formal education.
