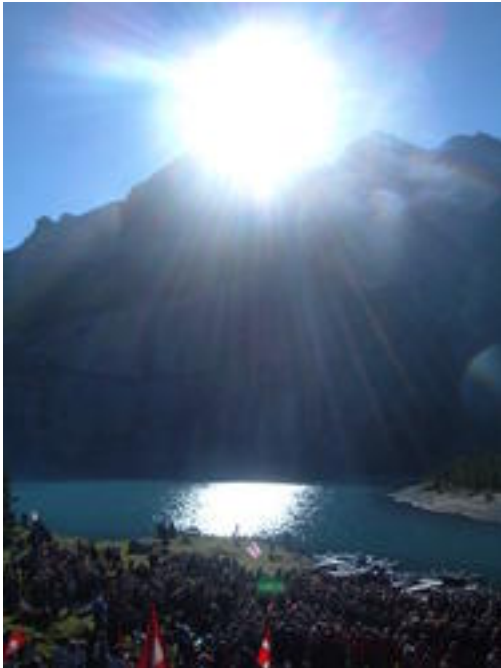




Centenary thank you!

There have been spectacular events throughout the year including: the Cederberg Adventure and Mafeking Moot in South Africa, the Australian National Jamboree, Sudan Centenary celebrations in Khartoum, the creation of a fleur-de-lis in the centre of Mexico City using over 1.6 million aluminium cans, the Asia-Pacific peace relay, Swiss igloo village near Crans-Montana, JamBE in Belgium, the Korean Agonoree, the Amahoro project and gathering in the Great Lakes Region of Africa, the 'Mocca' Centenary camp in Luxembourg, a 100 hour walk in Mauritius, the East-Africa Peace Caravan through Tanzania, Uganda and Kenya, the 'Jamboree-on-the-train' in Bangladesh, the Peace Caravan from Paris to Dakar, the expedition to the top of the Baden-Powell Scout Peak in Nepal, and of course the 21st World Scout Jamboree in the United Kingdom and World Scientific Congress in Geneva, Switzerland.

Scouting's Sunrise was also an incredible global celebration. The photos and stories from this day really speak for themselves, and show how Scouting is modern, colourful, passionate, exciting and adventurous.
